

1. In the last supper, Jesus declared, in multiple ways, that Judas was the betrayer (Matthew 26:20-25, Mark 14:17-20, John 13:25-26). Why then did the apostles allow Judas to leave without arresting him?
2. What thought was captivating the attention of the apostles in the last supper? (Luke 22:22-26). Why, do you think, were they occupied with this thought?

In your daily life, what could cause you to be distracted such that you miss God's warning about something?

3. Scripture says that the devil "entered" Judas at least twice (Luke 22:3-4 and John 13:27). Do you worry about being under the control of the devil? How can you protect yourself? (1 John 5:18, Colossians 2:15, Ephesians 6:10-12, 16-17).
4. Jesus said that it was better for Judas not to have been born (Mark 14:21). But God allowed Judas to be born, and God chose Judas as an apostle, because delivering Jesus to the Jewish leaders was a necessary step in the plan of salvation. Therefore, Judas should not be held accountable for delivering Jesus. What is wrong with this argument?
5. In Acts 1:20, Peter clarified that Psalm 109:6-20 was a prophecy about Judas. Verse 7 of this prophecy says that the prayer of Judas was a sin. How can prayer become a sin?
6. Imagine that you are one of the 12 apostles having supper with Jesus, and you heard him say his words in John 13:34. How did Jesus show His love for you, through the three years that you accompanied him as an apostle?
